PT. SATYA NARAYANA CHARKA is Director of the East-West School of Dance, NY. He has studied with Pt. R.K. Shukla, Smt. Maya Rao, Pt. Shambhu Maharaj, and Pt. Birju Maharaj. Pt. Charka is recognized as one of the foremost exponents of Indian classical dance. He has presented numerous dance dramas and traditional dance recitals worldwide. He served as a cultural representative appointed by the Govt. of India in Japan, Australia, and the Fiji Islands.
